"SALESMAN" WILL PLAY HERE

"Salesman," a controversial documentary feature, will play April 20-22 in the New Ballroom. Monday, the film will be shown at 8:00 p.m. and Tuesday and Wednesday 7:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m.

"Salesman" won three Academy Award nominations. The film can be best described as a cinematic mural of America's lower middle class Catholic-oriented landscape. "Salesman" has received overwhelming acclaim from New York critics and audiences. Its power and message has been praised by authors Arthur Miller, Truman Capote, and Norman Mailer.

Ray Kril, film area advisor of Union Board, recommends "Salesman" as a movie that should be seen.
