 - American Academy of College of Pharmacy (AACP) will vote at 2022 Annual meeting July 2022 on a policy statement to expand education on climate change in pharmacy curricula nationwide
 - AACP supports the integration of diverse curricular components related to social forces and environmental factors
 and the impact on the environment, health, and health equity within Doctor of Pharmacy and graduate education
 programs to support the development of knowledge necessary to understand the role pharmacists, pharmaceutical

 - Iowa Climate Statement: <u>iowaenvironmentalfocus.org/iowa-climate-statement</u>
 - Iowa will get hotter and increased precipitation so our actions need to be geared toward making policy that will help us manage this
 - Some good in lowa, for example: wind turbines are paid for by federal tax dollars
 - Ulowa could be more aggressive in bringing students who can become leaders in climate change
 - Question 2010 Vote for Constitutionally Protected Fund to Invest Environmental Sustainability
 - Vote was approved, taxes were raised
 - Mechanism to fund the next time a sales tax increase is increased, the first 3/8 of each penny would go to this fund (a proposal is out to increase sales tax currently)
 - The proposal out is to sunset the local tax increases and make an increase in state sales tax and it will be a challenge to do so
 - The legislature has not approved a sales tax increase since this time

 - Question water in Iowa

- Republicans have little interest in having control on agriculture water pollution so there are no plans to address the problems with our water
- o We have a policy that voluntarily asks farmers to do better and it has failed
- State budget 12 million dollars for department of natural resources
 - Cut from 18 million to 12 million for the last 13 years this has not been increased
 - thegazette.com/state-government/park-rangers-speak-out-about-losing-housing-in-iowa-state-parks
- Question what should this committee focus on?
 - o New hospital in UIHC and its impact on University's carbon footprint
 - How can we meet the needs of incoming students on the topic of sustainability?
 - Reduction of pesticides
 - Currently have language drafted within purchasing that will reduce purchasing of dangerous pesticides
 - Question: has the University considered advertising more after the pesticides are applied? Better signage to minimize dermal exposure
 - Integrated pest management plan is also underway which will address this topic
 - Additionally, we are requesting report of applications from third party vendors (what was applied, how much, etc)
- Question Solar Policy
 - Solar tax credit federally; we also have a solar tax credit in Iowa
 - Money to homeowners and businesses to put solar on (example, half paid for by the state)
 - lowa's credit has phased out because it was a % of the federal tax and Republicans reduced the tax for this federally
 - The state has at least allowed local governments to continue to determine if solar is used
 - Federal support is still good
- Question is there a future for CGRER
 - Since 2017 when Republican took control in Iowa, funding has been eliminated for multiple suitability-focused research centers
 - These were created to focus on sustainable energy, water quality, sustainable agriculture, etc.
 - o CGRER continues to explore funding options
 - o Relatedly: leopold.iastate.edu/
- Question new farm bill
 - o Possibly will include incentives for conservation (Tom Vilsack will be involved in role as Secretary of Agriculture)
 - o Likely depends on who has control of the House at that time
